



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## **SUMMARY OF COUNCIL'S ACTIVITIES AND DECISIONS**

### **Facilities Committee (2011-12)**

**Committee Members: Councillors:- M Harwood(Chair), C Roberts, S Roberts and Sanford.**

**Ex-officio members: Councillors:- Winney and Mumford**

The Town Council's Facilities Committee has been busy on a number of projects during the past 12 months.

### **The Walnut Tree Field**

Since taking over administration of the playground it became clear that much of the equipment was past its best, and the Council initiated a programme of improvement and replacement where necessary. The swings were repainted thanks to some public spirited volunteers, and the ground under them was levelled. New equipment has been installed to replace the trim trail and a new roundabout has also been installed. The Council decided to extend its closed circuit television system to combat the isolated vandalism which occurred. It was hoped to replace the skateboard ramp, and a small group got together to prepare a model of what the youngsters were keen to have, but before we can progress the idea we must see more involvement of youngsters and their parents in the project, which will involve time and money.

## **Walkers Are Welcome**

The team set up to involve the town in the Walkers Are Welcome organisation has secured accreditation and will hopefully help us with the new footpath which we would like to see along the Fairford end of the old Fairford to Lechlade railway line.

## **Horizon 2016**

The year saw the completion of the Horizon 2016 document and Councillors are taking steps to realise some of its objectives. Talks have begun with Farmor's School which will hopefully lead to improved access to the Sports Centre and, importantly, involvement of young people in the Council's discussions on services.

## **Youth Provision**

The Council was given the task of rescuing the youth service, and happily a team led by District Councillor Mark Wardle and some other Town Council worthies has been able to secure a basic service for the town. We hope that the one-day-a-week club can be expanded in due course, but for that we need volunteers from the public prepared to spend some time helping in its development.

The Council remains determined to improve services available to local people but that requires more input by volunteers in the community.

## **The Festive Market**

This was again very successful, attracting a good range of stalls and visitors. Our thanks go to Coln House School who provided art work which transformed the Bus Shelter into Santa's Grotto. Local choirs and Street Entertainer Thomas Trilby also added to the occasion. The Town Council broke even on this event as we were successful in our bid for a grant from the Gloucestershire Market Towns Forum.

## **Communication**

The Town Council continues to publish a bi-monthly newsletter which is delivered to all households in Fairford. We also have a page in Ripples, the Community Magazine. Work has been done on the website to improve it.

## **Planning Committee (2011-12)**

**Committee Members: Councillors:- S. Jones(Chair), M Jones, Boulton and Cusack (Part).**

It has been a busy year for the committee which has dealt with about 50 planning applications, some more than once as they are revised. There have also been nearly 30 applications to look at from The Lakes by Yoo development between Fairford and Lechlade.

Fairford has proved to be a target for developers. The Town Council has been in consultation with potential developers to try and minimise any adverse impact on Fairford and maximise any advantages. We have drawn up a Protocol for Engaging with Developers to guide us and a Wish List for any Planning Gain that we can negotiate. In accordance with the Horizon 2016 document we have requested provision of allotments in new developments, highway safety features and parking improvements. An application for 44 houses came in for Pip's Field. The Town Council arranged a Public Meeting on 12<sup>th</sup> September 2011 so that residents could find out more about the proposals and give their views. We have also encouraged Archstone Land, another potential developer of 125 houses to the east of Fairford, to consult with the public and they held a public display last autumn. This application has now been formally submitted to CDC.

The Town Council has always supported the building of 15 affordable/social houses at Pip's Field in accordance with the Horizon 2016 document, but felt the original 44 houses too dense and we were concerned that flooding and sewage problems could be exacerbated and that some of the houses were too near to homes in Bettertons Close. The application has finally been given the go ahead, but with 37 houses instead of 44.

The Town Council instigated a Housing Needs Survey with the help of the Gloucestershire Rural Community Council which was delivered to all households in Fairford. 567 questionnaires from 1441 households were returned, a 39% response rate, and it was established that 37 households in Fairford or with a local connection need affordable housing in the next few years. This will help the Council respond to new planning applications. An Executive Summary of the report was circulated to all Households in the December Town Council Newsletter.

Other major planning applications have been for the Coln Country Park, Fairford Concrete, the conversion of the Bridge Restaurant to 4 residential units, and 6 affordable homes at the edge of the Horcott Industrial Estate.

Planning Rules and regulations are constantly changing especially with the Government's new Localism Bill. The Planning Chair attended a training course held at Cotswold District Council on June 2011 and 3 members of the Committee went to a training session in Northleach on Neighbourhood Planning in February of this year.

## **Highways Committee(2011-12)**

**Committee Members: Councillors:- Boulton (Chair) , M. Jones and Harwood.**

The Highways Committee has had a busy but frustrating year. The most frustrating being the resurfacing of the path from Dilly's Bridge to Gas Lane. We are aware the surface is not quite there yet, but with a bit more work done with the Public Rights of Way, we hope that this will finally be completed soon.

At the present time, the most challenging proposal is the parking in the High Street and Market Place. A questionnaire was sent out in 2010 to obtain the views from the public regarding parking in this area. The results from the survey showed that a greater percentage of people wanted some form of restrictions to be in place, but the difference between this and those that wanted no restrictions was negligible, so the Council agreed to conduct a survey of parking habits over a 6 month period and during this time no restrictions were in place. Following this a further questionnaire was sent out. Again the feedback from the Town was poor with only 42 people responding. The responses showed that 55% of respondents want no restriction in place. The Highways Committee took this proposal to the Full Council meeting in May. However, Full Council rejected the proposal. This information was then taken to GCC. Following a meeting with GCC, FTC need to agree a proposal on the parking that is supported by the majority of Councillors. If no agreement can be reached, GCC will reinstate what was originally in place i.e. 1 hour a restriction on the High Street & Market Place. Ideally, FTC will come up with a proposal that is acceptable to the majority of residents and Councillors which will then be given to GCC to implement. It behoves the Council to find a solution that is acceptable to the residents, as any alteration to the existing restrictions, will require a substantial amount of money to be spent (in the region of £5k-£8k) and the more objections raised after GCC have put the wheels in motion will increase this amount due to legal fees.

The Committee have also been looking at positions in the town to put up new notice boards and seating. If there is anywhere in particular that you would like to see these items introduced, then please let us know.

This year a new grass contractor has been employed to cut the verges, the burial ground and the Walnut Tree Field grass.

## **Finance Committee (2011-12)**

**Committee Members: Councillors:- Wardle(Chair), Cusack (part), Hinton (part) and Hing.**

**Ex-officio members: Councillors:- Winney and Mumford**

For the fourth year in succession the Town Council has been able to freeze the level of precept paid by local residents for services provided by the Council. This has been achieved through careful management of expenditure and prioritizing the projects we wish to support.

Proceeds from the sale, in the previous financial year, of the old Council offices on London Street have allowed the Council to repay the loan taken to purchase the Community Centre and has left a balance which will be held in reserve for future capital projects (the only use to which we are legally allowed to put the funds).

It is also pleasing to report the Council has been able to support a number of projects this year: £15,000 has been committed towards the flood defence project which the Environment Agency has now approved; equipment in the Walnut Tree Field is undergoing a major re-vamp ahead of the summer; the town CCTV system has been extended to include the Walnut Tree Field area and the Community Centre; the Council has also stepped in to fill the gap in youth provision caused by GCC's decision to withdraw services. Grants to local groups, including the Jubilee celebrations, have been made as follows:

## **CDC REPORT**

There has been much to learn during my first year as District Council. The key ongoing issue remains budgetary pressure as a consequence of frozen Council Tax and reduced Government Support Grants. There have been savings made through joint working with neighbouring authorities and will be more to come from transfer of the waste collection service to a company jointly owned with Cheltenham Borough Council. The change in service provider has also enabled the introduction of a rigid plastic collection service – Fairford will see the first collections in October. It is to be hoped that a more transparent and detailed budget process will be introduced for the next financial cycle – this could lead to further savings being identified.

The planning application at Pips Field for 37 homes has been approved. Pressure both from the District Councillors and the Town Council resulted in conditions with particular regard to flooding and drainage issues. It is likely that Fairford, in common with similar settlements, will be faced with further planning applications outside of the existing boundary so long as CDC cannot demonstrate a 5 year housing supply and in the absence of a completed Local Development Framework. The LDF will not be finalised until late 2013. Changes in central government policy and direction have resulted in delays to the process of developing the LDF – this is an experience common to many authorities, not just CDC.

## **COUNTY COUNCIL REPORT**

Money from the Government has been greatly reduced, which has resulted in services being cut, such as the Youth provision. GCC have concentrated their funds into two main areas, Care of the Elderly and Young people at risk. 55% of the total budget has been allocated to these and this is set to rise still further. They have now also had to obtain support from the NHS. The cuts are spread over 4 years and total £114m. The cuts have been county wide. Communities have had to step in.

The Registration Service (registering births and deaths) is still operating in Cirencester, but from the Library on an appointments basis, contrary to the belief that this has been moved to Stroud and Gloucester. GCC cannot do everything but have to focus on essentials and will continue to do so e.g. £151k has gone towards the flood scheme and £2 million to young people to help them obtain a first mortgage. One other downside is the loss of jobs at GCC 1300 people have left their employment with a further 200-300 more to lose their jobs in the coming year. Many queries are received relating to potholes and a new system has been introduced for pothole filling.

## **SUMMARY OF ACTIVITIES FROM OTHER GROUPS IN THE TOWN**

### **REPORT FROM FEAG (FAIRFORD EMERGENCY ACTION GROUP)**

The emergency action plan was tested at an exercise held on Saturday 28<sup>th</sup> April 2012. The exercise simulated another flood situation. Details of the exercise and timing were deliberately not widely advertised as we also wished to test our volunteer call out procedures.

The exercise was observed by members of Gloucestershire County Council's emergency planning team, Gloucestershire Rural Community Council and representatives from Lydney, Moreton-in Marsh, Northleach and Southrop Parish Councils. Whilst we were a little thin on the ground with regard to volunteers available to answer the emergency (in reality we believe this would have been overcome) a number of situations were simulated with the help of the available volunteers which required various responses and actions to be carried out by our emergency support teams. In the main, the plan was proven to be a success, well organised and sustainable which impressed the observers and also proved the ability of the emergency teams to be flexible in terms of their own roles. Thanks go to all the volunteers who turned out and without whose support we could not have carried out the test exercise.

The exercise demonstrated that more volunteers are required to assist in case of an emergency, particularly in the Welfare and Manpower teams. Anyone interested should contact Trevor Hing on 01285 711122. If you are already on a list (some residents are on more than one list) and either no longer wish to continue or wish to change your original choice(s) please also let me know.

The Communications Team is also on the lookout for old type telephone handsets ie the non-cordless ones that plug straight into the BT socket. If you have a spare one that you no longer require, we can make use of it, so please drop it off at the Council Office.

## **REPORT FROM YOUTH CLUB**

Following withdrawal of funding by Gloucestershire County Council for Youth Services across the county Fairford was left without any local resource other than a room in the Community Centre on which rent had been paid up to November 2012. Through meetings of interested parties and the financial support of the Town Council a new Youth Group Management Committee was formed and the services of a voluntary organisation, Young Gloucestershire, employed to staff a new group with qualified youth workers.

The group sessions for ages 15-18 started up in November and have continued every Wednesday evening with an attendance level of up to 30 young people. Whilst it is true to say there was some initial teething problems these seem to have been overcome through a combination of the presence of additional volunteers within the Centre and the positive attitude of the young people themselves. The sessions combine a mixture of activities together with an element of education covering topics such as sexual health, smoking, substance abuse and nutrition. Good use has been made of the pool and table tennis tables with Young Gloucester bringing in additional equipment such as mixing decks. Some additional funds supplied through CDC will be used to fund activities in the coming months.

The Management Committee has planned for a younger group session to also be established with the aid of the Deanery Youth Worker. The Deanery is in the process of recruiting an appropriately qualified/experienced assistant and when this happens the sessions will be advertised, probably taking place on a Monday evening.

It is hoped that more can be done to integrate non-Councillors in the running of the group and also to use the sessions as a vehicle by which young people can have a say in the affairs of their town.

## **FAIRFORD COMMUNITY CENTRE**

Just 10 years ago, the Fairford town meeting made a very important decision. The Centre building was for sale – it was in a poor state, kitchen condemned, electrical wiring substandard, floor rotten and a smell of decay and damp everywhere – but there was a strong feeling that the building was important to the town, and vital as a place where community services could be delivered. The Church, too, relied on the building for kitchen and toilets and to serve as a parish hall. So the Church and the Town Council got together and made plans to buy the building, raise the money to restore it and add modern amenities, and use it to provide facilities for the whole community. To buy the building, the Council would need a large loan, and repaying the loan would require an increase in Council Tax. There were pros and cons, but the scheme was given the go ahead. 10 years later, here we are! The building was rescued, the loan is fully paid off. We raised over £1million for improvements and we have a fine building which is very well used. As well as a venue for meetings, parties, coffee mornings, charity lunches, funeral wakes and the like, there is a wide range of regular activities including art classes, exhibitions, bridge club, Cambridge Diet, Country Market, exercise and fitness classes, history society, toddler groups, Rainbows, U3A, the youth club and a host of others. The new Police Point is also active. There are lots of facilities for our lively town.

This year has seen re-decorating and a new carpet in the Farmor Room, and we have bought new tables, crockery and glassware. We are also in the process of developing our new website. In order to maintain first class service and facilities we have passed stages one and two of the Hallmark Scheme and are now working towards the 3<sup>rd</sup> and highest level.

We are a registered charity, not a profit making organization, and we only charge what is needed to run the place. Financially we have made a loss this year. There are good reasons for this. One of them is that GCC cut all financial provision for youth activities; however we allowed use of the Keble Room free of charge for youth club activities for 9 months. This has enabled the youth club to keep going until the Town Council could organise a new youth management structure and appropriate finance. We have good reserves and the Trustees are taking steps to meet our budget for next year.

We are extremely grateful to the FCC Trustees for all their hard work, to Sadie and Eric our centre managers, and to all the people who have helped in so many ways. Our aim is to keep the building in good order, keep prices down and users happy. Work at the Centre has grown and developed tremendously. With a little help from the community we can continue to keep prices low and serve the community in the most effective way.

## **POLICE REPORT FOR FAIRFORD**

This time last year the Constabulary was just starting on its reorganization, which included a reduction in the number of officers based at Fairford. This means we are now down to one police officer and two PCSO who make up the team dedicated to the local area. We cover Fairford, Lechlade, Down Ampney, Kempsford, Bibury, up to Northleach and everything in between.

This year has also seen many challenges for the local team. The most obvious has been the closure of the police station last June. Since then we have been based from Cirencester Police station, which has obviously impacted on the way we work. We have a police point in the Community Centre where we hold regular surgeries and we have also introduced a monthly stall on the Wednesday market, where people can go for advice. Anyone is welcome to visit. There are no computers at the police point so we currently have to travel to and from Cirencester a lot which impacts on our time. However, later this year we will be trialling mobile devices which should help to alleviate this problem.

As well as our usual patrolling we have also been involved in: visits to local schools; test purchases from local shops; attending events and local fairs; working with housing associations; carrying out speed checks and vehicle point checks and holding regular surgeries.

Because of the fall in police officer numbers we are also being tasked with back-filling into Cirencester to provide cover there and on other operations throughout the county. The riots, in London, last summer also impacted on us. Although we weren't directly affected here, the repercussions of the riots were felt throughout the summer with us having to provide additional cover across the county.

However, we have still managed to see a reduction in crime and we hope to continue that into next year. Overall crime has reduced 12% in the year May 2011-2012 compared to the previous 12 months.

Assaults with injury - down 35%

Dwelling burglaries - down 80%

Criminal damage - down 33%

103 substantiated crimes in Fairford May 2011-2012 - down from 117 in the previous 12 months

## **RAF FAIRFORD**

RAF Fairford is still operating on a 48 hour activation basis, and its primary missions are global strike, RIAT and RAF Deployed Operations Training. Recent financial constraints within the USAF led to the drawdown of American military personnel from RAF Fairford, but due to the long runway, the large stock of aviation fuel, bed spaces and huge infrastructure in place, the USAF does not want to relinquish control of the base, which remains on "warm" status.

There have been a number of operations at the base in April and May, and exercises are scheduled again in October and November 2012. The Royal International Air Tattoo will take place in early July.

The housing on base is currently being utilized by RAF families stationed at RAF Brize Norton, where there is a severe housing shortage. The British families who live in RAF Fairford housing are unable to use any of the (now very limited) facilities on base, due to HMRC tax implications. These families are using facilities in the town.
